

WHAT IS MONTESSORI?

Montessori is a scientific method of education, developed by Dr. Maria Montessori, aimed towards educating children through direct control of their environment. It focuses on the whole child's physical, spiritual, social, mental, and emotional development and instills mindfulness, kindness, peace, and freedom within a prepared environment.

The environment is methodically organized to meet the children's needs with providing specially designed materials and presentations, appropriate to their sensitive periods. This is achieved by using hands-on learning materials and incorporating movement in all activities.

The Montessori classroom is orderly and organized to help the child develop a sense of order, the need to explore, learn independently, stay calm, respect, and be peaceful.

The Montessori curriculum includes areas of Practical Life which consist of exercises to enhance motor skills used in everyday life, Sensorial to explore the child's senses, Cultural to learn about the world around them, Math to understand mathematical functions in concrete form, and Language to each vocabulary, writing, and reading skills.

INFANT MILESTONES

1-2 MONTHS



- Effectively draws in and swallows easily
- Turns heads from side to side when lying on tummy
- Startles easily in response to loud noises
- Turns head in direction that cheek is touched



3-4 MONTHS

- Holds rattle and smiles
- Makes cooing sounds like "ooh" and "aah"
- Rolls from tummy to back
- Plays with hands by touching them together or putting them in the mouth

4-6 MONTHS



- Laughs and Babbles, like saying
- "bababa" or "dadada"
- Balances self while sitting for a few seconds
- Moves toys from hand to hand
- Turn toward sounds like your voice or music



6-9 MONTHS

- Sits up without falling
- Crawls/creeps forward on tummy
- by moving arms and legs
- Holds something in each hand at the same time
- Pulls up to stand by holding on to furniture
- Shakes head to say "no"

9-12 MONTHS



- Take steps by holding on to furniture
- Picks up small objects, toys & finger foods
- Waves "bye-bye"
- Says "Mama" or "Dada" to the right person
- Looks at pictures in books

TODDLER MILESTONES

12-15 MONTHS



- Walks without help
- Drinks from cup without help
- Picks up small objects and drops in container
- Points and asks for things
- Scribbles on paper using crayon

15-18 MONTHS



- Points to body parts eyes, nose, mouth when you name them
- Shows emotions happy or sad
- Tries to talk and repeat words
- Feed self with spoon but spills
- Looks at picture book and turns pages

18-24 MONTHS



- Points to pictures in book when you name them
- Puts words together like "mommy shoes,"
 "see car," or "go bye-bye"
- Shows affection offers hugs and kisses
- Plays actively with toys kicks large ball, stacks things, etc.
- Takes off clothes on their own like hat, shoes, socks

TODDLER (12-24 MONTHS)

COGNITIVE



- Matching a cut-out piece and its outline
- Assembling a simple puzzle
- Matching geometric shapes
- Distinguishing same from different
- Tracing & matching shapes
- Matching numbers
- Identifying objects belonging to a specific group
